2025 Legislative Session

FROM THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RENEE AMAR

As we emerge from a particularly heated legislative session, it is most gratifying to sift through the complexities and assess the actions taken over the past months with a focus on data.

This fiscal session was undeniably busy, as evidenced by the numerous votes cast. The House hit the ground running, working diligently to pass at least two dozen bills aimed at reforming the state's legal system. Their goal was not merely to rearrange existing structures, but to construct an entirely new framework. There was extensive debate surrounding various policy issues, and the House members certainly undertook a significant amount of the groundwork, which is clearly reflected in their legislative scorecards. We appreciate the leadership in the House for their efforts to ensure fair treatment within the state's court system.

In contrast, the Senate followed its usual pattern by only considering a select few of the bills passed by the House, ultimately rejecting the majority. While some commendable public policy measures were enacted, this experience highlights the reality that "more work needs to be done."

A notable concern regarding voting records this year was that a large portion of the votes took place over just one or two days. If a lawmaker missed that critical day, they effectively missed voting on half of the measures. Consequently, we were hesitant to assign a percentage score to any legislator who only participated in a fraction of the votes; those individuals received a *. Their constituents are encouraged to inquire about their absence—some lawmakers were unwell, others had personal or professional obligations, and some reasons remain unknown. We leave this to you to explore.

Additionally, Rep. Terry Landry, who was elected mid-session, is marked with a ** as he did not have the chance to vote on the majority of bills.



- HB 148 by Rep Wiley, rate setting. Requires insurers to provide prior premium amounts with renewals and repeals distinctions in market regulation. A no vote is a vote with LMTA. Passed House (67–33–4). Effective date: 08/01/2025.
 - HB 148, Amendment by Rep Glorioso. A no vote is a vote with LMTA. Passed in the House (67–33–4).
 - HB 148, concur in Senate amendments. A no vote is a vote with LMTA. Passed in the House (76-18-11).
- HB 336 by Rep Wilder, venue for uninsured motorist action. Provides relative to venue for certain actions involving uninsured and underinsured motorist policies. A yes vote is a vote with LMTA. Passed House (67–25–12). Stalled in Senate Judiciary A Committee.
- HB 427 by Rep Bamburg, reversionary trust. Provides for a reversionary trust. A yes vote is a vote with LMTA. Passed House (63-23-18). Stalled in Senate Judiciary A Committee.
- HB 431 by Rep Chenevert, modified comparative fault. Establishes modified comparative fault standards. A yes vote is a vote with LMTA. Passed in the House (67–26– 11). Effective date: 01/01/2026.
 - HB 431, concur in Senate amendments. A yes vote is a vote with LMTA. Passed in the House (75–22–8).
- HB 432 by Rep Chenevert, third party litigation agreements. Provides relative to disclosure of financing agreements. A yes vote is a vote with LMTA. Passed House (83-6-15). Stalled in Senate Judiciary A Committee.
- HB 434 by Rep Dewitt, "no pay, no play." Limits recovery for individuals who fail to maintain insurance. A yes vote is a vote with LMTA. Passed in the House (76–14–14). Effective 8/1/2025.
- HB 435 by Rep Egan, damages cap. Provides limitations relative to claims for general damages. A yes vote is a vote with LMTA. Passed House (63-23-18). Stalled in Senate Judiciary A Committee.
- HB 436 by Rep Firment, bars recovery for illegal aliens. Prohibits recovery of certain damages by unauthorized aliens. A yes vote is a vote with LMTA. Passed in the House (69–17–18). Effective 8/1/2025.

- HB 439 by Rep Hebert, limit attorney fees. Provides relative to a limit on attorney fees. A yes vote is a vote with LMTA. Passed in the House (57–30–17). Stalled in Senate Judiciary A Committee.
- 10. HB 440 by Rep Henry, requires use of health insurance when available. Provides relative to a claimant's duty to mitigate damages with respect to the actions for recovery. A yes vote is a vote with LMTA. Passed in the House (64-27-13). Stalled in Senate Judiciary A
- 11. HB 443 by Rep Henry, insurance notification. Provides relative to certain notifications in delictual actions. A yes vote is a vote with LMTA. Passed in the House (70-22-12). Stalled in Senate Judiciary A Committee.
- 12. HB 449 by Rep Carlson, attorney disclosure. Provides relative to fees reasonably expected to be earned by an attorney. A yes vote is a vote with LMTA. Passed in the House (63-23-18). Stalled in Senate Judiciary A Committee.
- 13. HB 450 by Rep Melerine, "Housely presumption." Creates evidentiary presumptions in personal injury cases. A yes vote is a vote with LMTA. Passed in the House (68-24-12). Effective 5/28/2025.
- 14. HB 561 by Rep Firment, surplus lines for insurance. Provides policy provisions and exceptions relative to surplus lines insurance. A yes vote is a vote with LMTA. Passed in the House (75–26–3). Stalled on Senate floor.
- 15. HB 660 by Rep Boyd, fees on trailers. Provides relative to the annual registration tax applicable to trucks and trailers statewide (EG INCREASE SD RV See Note). A no vote is a vote with LMTA. Failed in the House (61–32–11) and again (32-61-12).
- 16. HB 677 by Rep Carver, attorney advertising. A yes vote is a vote with LMTA. Passed in the House (75–25–4). Stalled in Senate Judiciary A Committee.
- 17. SB 111 by Sen Seabaugh, fair claims processing. Establishes fair claims handling standards. A yes vote is a vote with LMTA. Passed in the House (56–44–5). Vetoed by the Governor.
- 18. SB 231 by Sen Reese, medical billing transparency. Clarifies recoverable medical expenses in litigation. A yes vote is a vote with LMTA. Passed in the House (81–15–9). Effective 1/1/2026.

Many of the key votes occurred within a condensed timeframe, meaning absences during this period significantly affected participation. Legislators who missed a majority of these votes were not assigned a percentage score and are instead marked with an asterisk (*). Rep. Terry Landry, who joined the House mid-session, is noted with a double asterisk (**), reflecting his limited opportunity to vote.
